constructivism is a way of teaching where instead of just telling students what to believe teachers encourage them to think for themselves this means that teachers need to believe that students are capable of thinking and coming up with their own ideas this chapter analyses constructivism and the use of constructivist learning theory in schools in order to create effective learning environments for all students it discusses various conceptual approaches to constructivist pedagogy the key idea of constructivism in a constructivist classroom teachers play the role of facilitator more so than instructor instead of teachers telling students what and how to think the teacher creates a learning environment where students are encouraged to explore and become active participants in their educational experiences both types of constructivism focus on individuals thinking rather than their behavior but they have distinctly different implications for teaching related to three ideas in particular the relationship between learning and long term development the role or meaning of generalizations and abstractions during development and the mechanism by constructivism is an educational philosophy that underpins the inquiry based method of teaching where the teacher facilitates a learning environment in which students discover answers for constructivism is the theory that says learners construct knowledge rather than just passively take in information as people experience the world and reflect upon those experiences they build their own representations and incorporate new information into their pre existing knowledge schemas brooks and brooks list 12 characteristics for teaching by implementing constructivist learning theory into classroom instruction encourage and accept student autonomy and initiative use raw data and primary sources along with manipulation interaction and physical materials constructivist teachers encourage students to constantly assess how the activity is helping them gain understanding by questioning themselves and their strategies students in the constructivist teaching is based on the belief that learning occurs as learners are actively involved in a process of meaning and knowledge construction as opposed to passively receiving information history constructivist approach teaching methods are based on constructivist learning theory constructivism is a theory in education which posits that individuals or learners do not acquire knowledge and understanding by passive louipder depivting pintoject 2023-07-14 management body of knowledge 1/7
